For this database fundamental primary sources on the National Socialist state and the NSDAP, Nazi ideology and propaganda, National Socialist justice and legislation on resistance and persecution and annihilation and expulsion in the "Third Reich" have been compiled and digitized.

The Nazi propaganda literature from the YIVO Institute for Jewish research is considered to be one of the greatest contributions to Holocaust Study Resources. The significance of this collection lies not merely in its size, but also in the rarity - and in some cases, uniqueness- of many of the items it contains. The collection includes works on Nazi research about Jews and Judaism, anti-Semitic scholarship, "knapsack books" and many illustrated items that facilitate research on the visual representation of the Jews. IDC Publishers has been selected by the YIVO Institute as its exclusive partner for distributing the collection of Nazi propaganda literature. IDC makes this very important resource available for students of the Holocaust, anti-Semitism and German history and literature.
- **Nazi Propaganda Periodicals.** From IDC Publishers. 109 periodicals on 71 reels of microfilm.
In its mere twelve years of existence, the Nazi regime produced an astonishing amount of printed material. In the course of losing World War II, much of this vast output was lost, destroyed and scattered in various places. This new publication concentrates on Nazi Propaganda Periodicals.
This collection offers the researcher a valuable entry point into both famous and familiar publications as well as to more obscure periodicals dealing with local matters of German occupation policies. The publication of this impressive list of periodicals will hopefully contribute to further research in this area. Most periodicals were printed in Germany (Berlin, Leipzig, Hamburg, Munich) but also from Riga, Tallin, Belgrade, Bucarest, Cracow and Prague. The period covered is 1920-1945 with the majority from 1938-1944.
This collection, containing c. 300 titles will be published in 2008/2009 in 3 installments.
